PROCLAMATION OF THE CZECHOSLOVAK ACADEMY OF SCIENCE TO CZECHOSLOVAK SCIENTIFIC WORKERS

With the tragic disaster of great Stalin's death still paining the hearts of all progressive people the world over, our working people and the International Labour Movement heard the sad news about the death of the father of our People's Democracy, President of the Czechoslovak Republic and Chairman of the Communist Party of Czechoslovakia, our dearly beloved comrade Klement Gottwald.

Standing deeply moved by the coffin of comrade Klement Gottwald, we feel the immense loss that his death means to our science. In comrade Gottwald Czechoslovak science lost a pioneer who showed to the working people the way out of the capitalist oppression by grasping the principles of the social development in our country in a scientific way, and accordingly led the working people towards the building up of a happy and content socialist and communist society.
