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CONNECTED SIMPLE GRAPHS AND A SELECTION PROBLEM

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A problem left open by CEDER and BRUCKNER in [1] is the following (as modified by PAUL ERDŐS):

Suppose that M is a connected subset of the plane such that each vertical line intersects M in exactly two points. Does M contain a connected subset M_1 such that every vertical line intersects M_1 in exactly one point? In other words, must there exist a function (from R to R) whose graph lies in M and is connected? The example given below shows that such a selection is not always possible.


Let M be the union of the following plane sets:

{the graph of y = 0 for $x \le 1$ }; {the graph of y = 1 for $x \ge 1$ };

{the graph of y = x for $x \leq 0$ and $x \geq 1$ };

the closed straight line intervals from $(1 - 1/2^n, 1)$

to
$$(1 - 1/2^{n+1}, 0)$$
 for $n = 0, 1, 2, 3, ...$

Clearly, M is connected. Also it is clear that if one is to make a selection of one point for each vertical line which is to produce a connected set, one must choose only those points of M on the x-axis between x = 0 and x = 1. This is true because, roughly speaking, these points separate M between $-\infty$ and $+\infty$. But having done this, there is no way to connect to the points in M for $x \ge 1$ and $y \ge 1$.
