A COMMON GENERALIZATION OF KELLEY'S THEOREM (CONCERNING MEASURES ON A BOOLEAN ALGEBRA) AND OF VON NEUMANN'S

#### MINIMAX THEOREM

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Let (X,+) be a commutative semigroup with 0, let  $\omega$ :  $: X \longrightarrow [0,\infty]$  be subadditive  $(\omega(x+y) \le \omega(x) + \omega(y))$  and monotone  $(\omega(x) \le \omega(x+y))$ , and let A denote the family of all additive functionals  $\xi: X \longrightarrow [0,\infty]$  $(\xi(x+y) = \xi(x) + \xi(y))$ . For every subset  $Y \subset X$  we define the number  $K_{\omega}(Y) = \inf\{\frac{1}{4}, \omega(X) \neq y\}, \dots, y \in Y\}$ , where  $y_i$  are not necessarily distinct; with the convention that  $\emptyset = \infty$ .

Theorem. We have

 $K_{\omega}(Y) = \sup \{\inf \{(y): A \in \{\omega\}\}, \text{ the supremum being attained.}\}$ 

Corollary 1. (i) (ii),

- (i) there exists  $\xi \in A$  with  $\xi \leq \omega$  and  $\xi(y) > 0$  for all  $y \in Y$ ,
- (ii) there are  $Y_n \subset X$  with  $Y \subset \bigcup_{m=1}^{\infty} Y_n$  and  $X_{\omega}(Y_n) > 0$  for all n = 1, 2, ...

Corollary 2. Let (X,+,\*) be a semilinear space, and let  $\omega$  be, moreover, positively homogeneous (i.e.  $\omega$  ( $\infty x$ ) =  $-\infty \omega$  (x) for  $x \in X$ ,  $\infty \in \mathbb{R}^+$ ). Then

 $K_{C_2}(Y) = \inf \{ \omega(y) : y \in \text{conv } Y \} =$ 

= sup { inf  $\xi$  (y): L  $\ni \xi \neq \omega$  }, the supremum being attained.

Here L denotes the family of all  $\xi \in A$  that are positively homogeneous (semilinear).

Corollary 3 (J.L. Kelley). Let  $\mathcal{A}$  be a Boolean algebra, and for every non-empty subset  $\mathcal{B} \subset \mathcal{A}$  define the number

$$I(\mathfrak{H}) = \inf \left\{ \frac{i(\mathfrak{H})}{n(\mathfrak{H})} \right\}, \text{ where } \mathfrak{H} \text{ runs over all }$$

finite collections of elements of  ${\cal B}$  (not necessarily distinct), n( ${\cal C}$ ) is the number of elements of  ${\cal C}$ , and i( ${\cal C}$ ) is the maximal number of elements of  ${\cal C}$  with non-empty intersection. Then

I( $\mathfrak{B}$ ) = sup { inf m(B) }, the supremum, taken over all fini-BeB tely additive measures m:  $\mathcal{A} \longrightarrow [0,1]$ , being attained. There exists a strictly positive (m(A)>0 for A+0) finitely additive measure m on  $\mathcal{A}$  iff there are  $\mathcal{B}_{m} \subset \mathcal{A}$  with  $\mathcal{A} \setminus \{0\} \subset \mathcal{A}$  and I( $\mathcal{B}_{n}$ )>0 for all n = 1,2,...

Corollary 4 (J.von Neumann). Let S and T be arbitrary non-empty finite sets. Then for every function h:  $S \times T \longrightarrow (-\infty, \infty]$  we have

 $\inf \left\{ \max_{s \in S} \sum_{t \in T} f(t)h(s,t) : f: T \to [0,1], \sum_{t \in T} f(t) = 1 \right\} =$ 

=  $\sup \{ \min_{t \in T} \sum_{s \in S} g(s)h(s,t) : g: S \longrightarrow [0,1], \sum_{s \in S} g(s) = 1 \}$ ,

the supremum and infimum being attained.
