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# APPLICATION OF ROTHE'S METHOD TO PERTURBED LINEAR HYPERBOLIC EQUATIONS AND VARIATIONAL INEQUALITIES 

Jozef Kačur, Bratislava

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Introduction. The main purpose of this paper is to apply Rothe's method to perturbed linear hyperbolic equations and inequalities. This method allows us to use direct variational methods in the case of hyperbolic equations or inequalities and to transfer some results from elliptic equations or inequalities to the corresponding hyperbolic ones.

In Part I we shall be concerned with abstract perturbed linear hyperbolic equations which can be applied to the following equation

\frac{\partial^{2} u}{\partial t^{2}}+\sum_{|i|,|j| \leqq k}(-1)^{|i|} D^{i}\left(a_{i j}(x) D^{j} u\right)=f\left(t, x, u \cdot \nabla u, \ldots, \nabla^{k} u\right)
$$

for $0<t<T(T<\infty)$ and $x \in \Omega$, where $\Omega \subset R^{N}$ is a bounded domain with a Lipschitzian boundary $\partial \Omega$ and $f(t, x, \xi)$ is Lipschitz continuous in $t, \xi$. Together with ( $1^{\prime}$ ) the initial conditions

u(x, 0)=U_{0}(x), \quad \frac{\partial u(x, 0)}{\partial t}=U_{1}(x), \quad x \in \Omega
$$

and the corresponding boundary conditions (e.g. homogeneous Dirichlet boundary conditions) will be considered.

In Part II the corresponding hyperbolic variational inequality (see (6)) is considered.
Let $V, H$ be two Hilbert spaces with the norms $\|\cdot\|,|\cdot|$, respectively. We assume that $V \subset H, V$ is dense in $H$ and the imbedding $V G H$ is continuous. We consider a linear, bounded operator $A$ from $V$ into $V^{*}$ (the dual space to $V$ ). By $\langle u, v\rangle$ we denote the duality between $u \in V^{*}$ and $v \in V$ and by $(u, v)$ we denote the scalar product in $H$. We assume that the form $\langle A u, v\rangle$ generates (an equivalent) scalar product in $V$. Let $F(t, u)$ be a Lipschitz continuous operator from $\langle 0, T\rangle \times V$ into $H$ We consider $\left(1^{\prime}\right),\left(2^{\prime}\right)$ in the abstract form

u(0)=U_{0} \in V, \quad \frac{\mathrm{~d} u(0)}{\mathrm{d} t}=U_{1} \in V \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $u:(0, T) \rightarrow V$ is an abstract function with $\left(\mathrm{d}^{2} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t^{2}\right) \in H$. In our particular problem ( $\left.1^{\prime}\right),\left(2^{\prime}\right)$ and in the assertions concerning the regularity of solution we set $V \subset W_{2}^{k}(\Omega)$ with $\dot{W}_{2}^{k}(\Omega) \subset V \subset W_{2}^{k}(\Omega)\left(\dot{W}_{2}^{k}, W_{2}^{k}\right.$ are Sobolev spaces), $H=L_{2}(\Omega)$, $\langle A u, v\rangle=\sum_{|i|,|j| \leqq k} \int_{\Omega} a_{i j}(x) D^{j} u D^{i} v \mathrm{~d} x, F(t, u)=f\left(t, x, u, \nabla u, \ldots, \nabla^{k} u\right)$.
We apply Rothe's method (method of lines) to (1), (2) in the following way. Successively, for $i=1, \ldots, n$, we look for a solution $u_{i} \in V$ of the linear elliptic equation (corresponding to (1)), i.e., we solve the variational identity

\end{equation*}

for all $v \in V$, where $u_{0}=U_{0}, u_{-1}=U_{0}-h U_{1}, n$ is a positive integer, $h=T / n$, $t_{i}=i h$ and $U_{0}, U_{1}$ are from (2). By means of $u_{i}(i=0,1, \ldots, n)$ we construct Rothe's function

u_{n}(t)=u_{i-1}+\left(t-t_{i-1}\right) h^{-1}\left(u_{i}-u_{i-1}\right) \quad \text { for } \quad t_{i-1} \leqq t \leqq t_{i} \tag{4}
\end{equation*}

$i=1, \ldots, n$. We prove the convergence of $u_{n}(n \rightarrow \infty)$ to the solution $u$ of (1), (2), i.e., to the solution of the identity

for all $v \in V$ and a.e. $t \in(0, T)$.
Analogously we proceed in the case of the corresponding hyperbolic variational inequality. Let $K$ be a nonempty, closed, convex set in $V$. We look for a solution $u$ of the variational inequality

\left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^{2} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t^{2}}, v-\frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right)+\left\langle A u(t), v-\frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right\rangle \geqq\left(F(t, u(t)), v-\frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right) \tag{6}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $v \in K$ and a.e. $t \in(0, T)$, where $\mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t \in K$ and $u(0)=U_{0}, \mathrm{~d} u(0) / \mathrm{d} t=U_{1}$. In this case we apply Rothe's method in the following way. Successively, for $i=1, \ldots$ $\ldots$, $n$, we look for the solutions $z_{i} \in K$ of the linear elliptic variational inequalities

-h \sum_{j=1}^{i-1}\left\langle A z_{j}, v-z\right\rangle-\left\langle A U_{0}, v-z\right\rangle
\end{gather*}
$$

for all $v \in K$, where $z_{0}=U_{1}$. Then we construct $u_{i}=U_{0}+\sum_{j=1}^{i} h z_{j}$ and hence Rothe's function $u_{n}$ (see (4)). Convergence of $u_{n}$ to the unique solution $u$ of (6) is proved.

For simplicity we set $I=\langle 0, T\rangle$. We shall use the following functional spaces: $W_{2}^{k}(\Omega)$ (Sobolev space), $C(I, V)$ (the space of continuous abstract functions from $I$ into $V$ ), $L_{\infty}(I, V)$ (the space of bounded measurable abstract functions from $I$ into $V$ ), $L_{2}(I, V)$ (the space of measurable abstract functions for which $\|u\|_{L_{2}(I, V)}^{2}=$ $\left.=\left(\int_{I}\|u(t)\|_{V}^{2} \mathrm{~d} t\right)^{1 / 2}<\infty\right)$ ) and $C^{r, 1}(\bar{\Omega})$ (the space of real functions whose $r$-th derivatives are Lipschitz continuous in $\bar{\Omega}$ ), whose definitions and fundamental properties can be found in [11].
The problem (1'), (2') (Part I) has been solved in [1] in the case $f=f(t), a_{i j}=$ $=a_{i j}(t, x)$ by using Rothe's method. The solution $u$ possesses the properties $u \in$ $\in C(I, V), \quad \mathrm{d} u / \mathrm{d} t \in L_{\infty}(I, V) \cap C\left(I, L_{2}\right), \quad \mathrm{d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2} \in L_{\infty}\left(I, L_{2}\right)$ (under stronger assumptions $\left.\mathrm{d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2} \in L_{\infty}(I, V), \mathrm{d}^{3} u / \mathrm{d} t^{3} \in L_{\infty}\left(I, L_{2}\right)\right)$. In the more special cases of $\left(1^{\prime}\right),\left(2^{\prime}\right)$ this method has been used in [6], [7]. Here, we prove more regularity properties of the solution in the $x$-variable and a stronger convergence of $u_{n}$ to $u$. Let $0 \leqq l \leqq k$ be an integer. When $a_{i j} \in C^{r_{i}, 1}(\bar{\Omega})\left(r_{i}=\max \{0,|i|+l-k\}\right)$ then our solution is an element of the space $C(I, V) \cap L_{\infty}\left(I, W_{2}^{k+l}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)\right)$ for arbitrary $\Omega^{\prime} \subset \Omega$ with $\bar{\Omega}^{\prime} \subset \Omega$ (regularity in the interior of $\Omega$ ) and $\mathrm{d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2} \in L_{\infty}(I, H)$. Thus, in the case $l=k$ our solution satisfies ( $1^{\prime}$ ) for a.e. $(x, t) \in \Omega \times(0, T)$ in the classical sense. Under stronger assumptions on $F(t, v)$ (see (22)) we can prove $\mathrm{d}^{3} u / \mathrm{d} t^{3} \in$ $\in L_{\infty}(I, H), \mathrm{d} u / \mathrm{d} t \in L_{\infty}(I, V) \cap C(I, H)$ and the convergence $u_{n} \rightarrow u$ in the norm of the space $C\left(I, V \cap W_{2}^{k+l}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)\right)$ and $\mathrm{d}^{2} u_{n} / \mathrm{d} t^{2} \rightarrow \mathrm{~d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2}$ in $C(I, H)$. The results concerning the hyperbolic variational inequality (6) are analogous to those on the problem (1), (2) and are interesting also from the numerical point of view. Hyperbolic variational inequalities similar to our problem (6) have been solved, e.g., in [12], [13] by the method of penalization. We use some techniques developed in [1]-[5]. All results can be extended to the case $a_{i j}=a_{i j}(t, x)$ (see Remark 4).

## I. LINEAR PERTURBED HYPERBOLIC EQUATION

A priori estimates. Throughout the paper the letter $C$ will be used for positive constants. We allow $C$ to have different values in the course of discussion. We assume that the form $\langle A u, v\rangle$ represents (an equivalent) scalar product in $V$ and

The Lipschitz continuity of $F(t, u): I \times V \rightarrow H$ is assumed in the form

\left|F(t, u)-F\left(t^{\prime}, v\right)\right| \leqq L\left(\left|t-t^{\prime}\right|+\left|t-t^{\prime}\right|\|v\|+\|u-v\|\right) \tag{9}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $t, t^{\prime} \in I$ and $u, v \in V$.
We denote

z_{i}=\frac{u_{i}-u_{i-1}}{h}, \quad s_{i}=\frac{z_{i}-z_{i-1}}{h} \text { for } i=0,1, \ldots, n,
$$

where $u_{0}=U_{0}, u_{-1}=u_{0}-h U_{1}$ and $u_{-2}=h^{2}\left(-A U_{0}+F\left(0, U_{0}\right)\right)+2 u_{-1}-u_{0}$. We assume $U_{0} \in V$ and $U_{1} \in V$.

The existence of the unique solution $u_{i}(i=1, \ldots, n)$ of (3) is guaranteed by the Lax-Milgram (or Riesz) theorem.

Lemma 1. There exists $n_{0}>0$ and $C$ such that the estimate $\left\|u_{i}\right\|^{2}+\left|z_{i}\right|^{2} \leqq C$ holds for all $n>n_{0}, i=1, \ldots, n$.

Proof. From (3) for $v=u_{i}-u_{i-1}$ and from (8) we have

\left(\frac{z_{i}-z_{i-1}}{h}, u_{i}-u_{i-1}\right)+\left\langle A u_{i}, u_{i}-u_{i-1}\right\rangle=\left(F\left(t_{i}, u_{i-1}\right), u_{i}-u_{i-1}\right)
$$

and hence

2^{-1}\left|z_{i}\right|^{2}+2^{-1}\left|z_{i}-z_{i-1}\right|^{2}-2^{-1}\left|z_{i-1}\right|^{2}+2^{-1}\left\|u_{i}\right\|^{2}+2^{-1}\left\|u_{i}-u_{i-1}\right\|^{2}- \\
-2^{-1}\left\|u_{i-1}\right\|^{2} \leqq h\left(F\left(t_{i}, u_{i-1}\right), z_{i}\right) .
\end{gathered}
$$

From this inequality and (9) we obtain

\left|z_{i}\right|^{2}\left(1-C_{1} h\right)+\left\|u_{i}\right\|^{2} \leqq\left\|z_{i-1}\right\|^{2}+\left\|u_{i-1}\right\|^{2}\left(1+C_{2} h\right)+C h .
$$

Successively, from this inequality we deduce

\left(\left|z_{i}\right|^{2}+\left\|u_{i}\right\|^{2}\right)\left(1-C_{1} h\right)^{i} \leqq\left(\left|z_{0}\right|^{2}+\left\|u_{0}\right\|^{2}\right)\left(1+C_{2} h\right)^{i}+C= \\
=\left(\left|U_{1}\right|^{2}+\left\|U_{0}\right\|^{2}\right)\left(1+C_{2} h\right)^{i}+C,
\end{gathered}
$$

which implies our assertion.
Lemma 2. Let $A U_{0} \in H$. There exist $n_{0}$ and $C$ such that the estimate

\left\|z_{i}\right\|^{2}+\left|s_{i}\right|^{2} \leqq C \quad \text { holds for all } n>n_{0}, \quad i=1, \ldots, n .
$$

Proof. Let us consider (3) for $i=j$ and $i=j-1$, where $v=s_{j}$. Subtracting these identities we obtain

\left(s_{j}, s_{j}\right)+\left\langle A u_{j}-A u_{j-1}, s_{j}\right\rangle=\left(s_{j-1}, s_{j}\right)+\left(F\left(t_{j}, u_{j-1}\right)-F\left(t_{j-1}, u_{j-2}\right), s_{j}\right)
$$

and hence (see (8), (9))

$$
\begin{gathered}
\left|s_{j}\right|^{2}+\left\langle A z_{j}, z_{j}-z_{j-1}\right\rangle \leqq \\
\leqq 2^{-1}\left|s_{j}\right|^{2}+2^{-1}\left|s_{j-1}\right|^{2}+h C\left(1+\left\|u_{j-2}\right\|+\left\|z_{j-1}\right\|\right)\left|s_{j}\right|
\end{gathered}
$$

From this inequality, analogously as in Lemma 1, we obtain

\left\|z_{j}\right\|^{2}+\left\|z_{j}-z_{j-1}\right\|^{2}+\left|s_{j}\right|^{2}\left(1-C_{1} h\right) \leqq\left|s_{j-1}\right|^{2}+\left\|z_{j-1}\right\|^{2}\left(1+C_{2} h\right)+C_{3} h
$$

where the estimate $\left\|u_{i}\right\| \leqq C$ has been used. From this reccurent inequality we deduce

\left\|z_{j}\right\|^{2}+\left|s_{j}\right|^{2} \leqq C\left(1+\left|s_{0}\right|^{2}+\left\|z_{0}\right\|^{2}\right) \leqq C\left(1+\left|A U_{0}\right|^{2}+\left\|U_{1}\right\|^{2}\right)
$$

and the proof is complete.
Analogously as in (4) we construct $z_{n}(t), s_{n}(t)$ in terms of $z_{i}$, $s_{i}$, respectively. We also define the step functions $\bar{u}_{n}(t), \bar{z}_{n}(t), \bar{s}_{n}(t)$ as follows:

and analogously $\bar{z}_{n}(t), \bar{s}_{n}(t)$.
Lemmas 1 and 2 imply the a priori estimates

\left\|u_{n}(t)-\bar{u}_{n}(t)\right\|+\left|z_{n}(t)-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right| \leqq \frac{C}{n} \tag{12}
\end{gather*}

for all $n, t \in I$ and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|u_{n}(t)-u_{n}\left(t^{\prime}\right)\right\|+\left|z_{n}(t)-z_{n}\left(t^{\prime}\right)\right| \leqq C\left|t-t^{\prime}\right| \tag{13}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $n$ and $t, t^{\prime} \in I$.
Moreover, by the regularity results on elliptic equations (see [8]) and from (3) we conclude regularity for $u_{i}$ in the case of $\left(1^{\prime}\right),\left(2^{\prime}\right)$. Indeed, from the identity

\left(\left|f_{i, n}\right| \leqq C \quad \text { for all } n, \quad i=1, \ldots, n\right)
\end{gathered}
$$

and the regularity assumption

a_{i j} \in C^{r_{i}, 1}(\bar{\Omega}) \quad \text { where } \quad r_{i}=\max \{0,|i|+l-k\}, \quad 0 \leqq l \leqq k, \tag{14}
\end{equation*}
$$

we obtain (see [8])

\left\|u_{i}\right\|_{W^{2}+{ }^{\prime}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)} \leqq C\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)\left(\left\|u_{i}\right\|+\left|f_{i, n}\right|\right) \leqq C\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)
$$

for all $n, i=1, \ldots, n$, where $\Omega^{\prime}$ is an arbitrary subdomain of $\Omega$ with $\bar{\Omega}^{\prime} \subset \Omega$. The estimate ( $15^{\prime}$ ) implies

\left\|u_{n}(t)\right\|_{W_{2^{k+1}}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)}+\left\|\bar{u}_{n}(t)\right\|_{W_{2^{k+l}}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)} \leqq C\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right) \quad \text { for all } \quad t \in I . \tag{15}
\end{equation*}
$$

As a consequence of our notation we have $\mathrm{d}^{-} u_{n}(t) / \mathrm{d} t=\bar{z}_{n}(t), \mathrm{d}^{-} z_{n}(t) / \mathrm{d} t=\bar{s}_{n}(t)$ where $\mathrm{d}^{-} / \mathrm{d} t$ is the left hand derivative. The variational identity (3) can be rewriten in the form

for all $n$ and $t \in(0, T)$, where $\bar{u}_{n}(t)=u_{0}$ for $t \in(-T / n, 0\rangle, F^{(n)}(t, v)=F\left(t_{i}, v\right)$ for $t_{i-1}<t \leqq t_{i}, i=1, \ldots, n$ and $F^{(n)}(t, v)=F(0, v)$ for $t \in(-T / n, 0\rangle$. By passing to the limit $n \rightarrow \infty$ in (16) we prove the convergence of $u_{n}(t)$ and $z_{n}(t)$.

Lemma 3. Let $A U_{0} \in H$. Then there exists $u \in C(I, V)$ with

\frac{\mathrm{d} u}{\mathrm{~d} t} \in C(I, H) \cap L_{\infty}(I, V), \quad \frac{\mathrm{d}^{2} u}{\mathrm{~d} t^{2}} \in L_{\infty}(I, H)
$$

such that

u_{n} \rightarrow u \quad \text { in } C(I, V), \quad z_{n} \rightarrow \frac{\mathrm{~d} u}{\mathrm{~d} t} \quad \text { in } C(I, H)
$$

and the estimate

\left|z_{n}-\frac{\mathrm{d} u}{\mathrm{~d} t}\right|^{2}+\left|\frac{\mathrm{d} u_{n}}{\mathrm{~d} t}-\frac{\mathrm{d} u}{\mathrm{~d} t}\right|^{2}+\left\|u_{n}-u\right\|^{2} \leqq \frac{C}{n}
$$

takes place uniformly for $t \in I$.
Proof. Let us subtract (16) for $n=r$ and $n=s$, where $v=\bar{z}_{r}(t)-\bar{z}_{s}(t)$ (in the sequel we omit $t$ ). Then we obtain

\left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^{-}}{\mathrm{d} t}\left(z_{r}-z_{s}\right), z_{r}-z_{s}\right)+\left\langle A\left(u_{r}-u_{s}\right), \frac{\mathrm{d}^{-}}{\mathrm{d} t}\left(u_{r}-u_{s}\right)\right\rangle=\left(F^{(r)}\left(t, \bar{u}_{r}\left(t-\frac{T}{r}\right)\right)-\right. \\
\left.-F^{(s)}\left(t, \bar{u}_{s}\left(t-\frac{T}{s}\right)\right), \bar{z}_{r}-\bar{z}_{s}\right)+\left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^{-}}{\mathrm{d} t}\left(z_{r}-z_{s}\right), z_{r}-\bar{z}_{r}+\left(\bar{z}_{s}-z_{s}\right)\right)+ \\
+\left\langle A\left(u_{r}-\bar{u}_{r}+\bar{u}_{s}-u_{s}\right), \frac{\mathrm{d}^{-}}{\mathrm{d} t}\left(u_{r}-u_{s}\right)\right\rangle .
\end{gathered}
$$

We integrate this inequality over $(0, t)$ and use the a priori estimates (10)-(13) and (9). Successively we obtain

.\left|z_{r}(\tau)-z_{s}(\tau)\right| \mathrm{d} \tau
\end{gathered}
$$

and hence

\left|z_{r}(t)-z_{s}(t)\right|^{2}+\left\|u_{r}(t)-u_{s}(t)\right\|^{2} \leqq C_{1}\left(\frac{1}{r}+\frac{1}{s}\right) \mathrm{e}^{c_{2} T} \tag{17}
\end{equation*}
$$

because of Gronwall's lemma. Thus, there exist $z \in C(I, H)$ and $u \in C(I, V)$ such that $u_{n} \rightarrow u$ in $C(I, V)$ and $z_{n} \rightarrow z$ in $C(I, H)$. Passing to the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$ in (13) we have

\left|z(t)-z\left(t^{\prime}\right)\right|^{2}+\left\|u(t)-u\left(t^{\prime}\right)\right\|^{2} \leqq C\left|t-t^{\prime}\right|
$$

which implies (see [9], [10]) $\mathrm{d} z / \mathrm{d} t \in L_{\infty}(I, H)$ and $\mathrm{d} u / \mathrm{d} t \in L_{\infty}(I, V)$. Passing to the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$ in the identity

$$

we easily find out $\mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t=z(t)$. Thus, $\mathrm{d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2}=\mathrm{d} z / \mathrm{d} t \in L_{\infty}(I, H)$. Passing to the limit for $s \rightarrow \infty$ in (17) and using (12) we obtain the estimate in Lemma 3 and the proof is complete.

Existence of solution. Theorem 1. Suppose (8), (9) and $A U_{0} \in H$. Then there exists a unique solution of (1), (2) with the properties

takes place for all $t \in I$ where $u_{n}(t)$ is from (4). In the case of $\left(1^{\prime}\right)$, (2'), when (14) is satisfied then $u \in L_{\infty}\left(I, W^{k+l}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)\right)$ where $\Omega^{\prime} \subset \Omega$ with $\bar{\Omega}^{\prime} \subset \Omega$.

Proof. Integrating (16) over $(0, t)$ we obtain

Lemma 3 and (12) imply

Since $\langle A \bar{u}(t), v\rangle,\left(F^{(n)}\left(t, \bar{u}_{n}(t-T \mid n), v\right)\right.$ are uniformly bounded (with respect to $t$ ), by passing to the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$ in (19) we have

$\mathrm{d} u(0) / \mathrm{d} t=z(0)=U_{1}$ and from Lemma 3, $u(0)=U_{0}$. From (1), (2) we deduce $A U \in L_{\infty}(I, H)$. The uniqueness of $u$ is obtained in the following way. If $U_{1}, u_{2}$ are two such solutions of (1), (2) then $u=u_{1}-u_{2}$ satisfies

Remark 1. We can prove continuous dependence of the solution of (1), (2) on the data $U_{0}, U_{1}$ and $F(t, v)$ proceeding analogously as in the proof of uniqueness (using (21) and Gronwall's lemma).

Assertion. Let $u_{i}(i=1,2)$ be two solutions of (1), (2) corresponding to $U_{0, i}, U_{1, i}$ and $F_{i}(t, v)$. If

\text { takes place for all } t \in I .
\end{gathered}

Indeed, for $u=u_{1}-u_{2}$ we deduce

Hence and from Gronwall's lemma we obtain the required result.
Remark 2. From (20) we deduce $(\mathrm{d} / \mathrm{d} t)(z(t), v) \in C(0, T)$. This means that the weak derivative $z_{t}(t)=(\mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t)_{t}$ exists and for a.e. $t \in I$ equals the strong derivative
$\mathrm{d} z(t) / \mathrm{d} t=\mathrm{d}^{2} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t^{2}$. Thus, (1), (2) is satisfied for all $t \in(0, T)$ with the weak derivative $(\mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t)_{t}$.

Under stronger regularity assumptions on $F(t, v)$ and $U_{0}, U_{1}$ we prove $\mathrm{d}^{3} u / \mathrm{d} t^{3} \in$ $\in L_{\infty}(I, H)$, which together with (14) (for $\left.\left(1^{\prime}\right),\left(2^{\prime}\right)\right)$ enables us to prove $u_{n} \rightarrow u$ in the norm $C\left(I, W_{2}^{k+l}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)\right)$ and $\mathrm{d}^{2} u_{n} / \mathrm{d} t^{2} \rightarrow \mathrm{~d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2}$ in $C(I, H)$. We suppose

\end{equation*}

for all $v_{1}, v_{2}, v_{3} \in V, t,(t-h),(t-2 h) \in I$, where $C(v)$ depends on $\left\|v_{1}\right\|,\left\|v_{2}\right\|,\left\|v_{3}\right\|$ and $\alpha\left[x_{1}, x_{2}, x_{3}, x_{4}, x_{5}\right]$ is a continuous nonnegative function in its variables.

In the case of $\left(1^{\prime}\right),\left(2^{\prime}\right)$, provided the imbedding $W_{2}^{k}(\Omega) \rightarrow C(\bar{\Omega})$ is continuous and $\left|f_{t t}^{\prime \prime}(t, s)\right|+\left|f_{t s}^{\prime \prime}(t, s)\right|+\left|f_{s s}^{\prime \prime}(t, s)\right| \leqq C_{1}\left(C_{1} \equiv C_{1}\left(C_{2}\right), s \in R\right)$ for $|s| \leqq C_{2}$, then (22) holds.

Let $S_{i}=\left(s_{i}-s_{i-1}\right) / h$ for $i=0,1, \ldots, n$, where we define $u_{-3}=2 u_{-2}-u_{-1}+$ $+h^{2}\left(-A u_{-1}+F\left(0, U_{0}\right)\right)$. As a consequence of this definition we have $\left|S_{0}\right|=\left|A U_{1}\right|$.

Lemma 4. Let $U_{0}, U_{1} \in V$ and $A U_{0}, A U_{1} \in H$. If (22) is satisfied, then there exist $n_{0}, C$ such that the estimate

Owing to Lemma 1 and $\left\|z_{0}\right\|+\left\|z_{-1}\right\|+\left\|z_{-2}\right\| \leqq C\left(\left|A U_{1}\right|+\left|A U_{0}\right|+\left\|U_{1}\right\|+\right.$ $\left.+\left\|U_{0}\right\|\right)$ we have $\left\|z_{j}\right\| \leqq C$ for $j=-2, \ldots, n$ and analogously $\left\|u_{j}\right\| \leqq C$ for $j=$ $=-3, \ldots, n$. Thus, from (24) we conclude analogously as in Lemma 1 and Lemma 2

Theorem 2. Let $U_{0}, U_{1} \in V, A U_{0} \in H, A U_{1} \in H$ and let $V G H$ be compact. Suppose (8), (9), (22), $u(t)$ is a solution of (1), (2) and $u_{n}(t)$ is from (4). Then $\mathrm{d}^{3} u / \mathrm{d} t^{3} \in$ $\in L_{\infty}(I, H), \quad \mathrm{d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2} \in C(I, H) \cap L_{\infty}(I, V)$ and the convergence $s_{n} \rightarrow \mathrm{~d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2}$ in $C(I, H)$ for $n \rightarrow \infty$ takes place. Moreover, in the case of $\left(1^{\prime}\right),\left(2^{\prime}\right)$, if $(14)$ is satisfied, then $u \in C\left(I, V \cap W_{2}^{k+l}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)\right.$ ) and $u_{n} \rightarrow u$ in $C\left(I, V \cap W_{2}^{k+l}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)\right)$ for $n \rightarrow \infty$, where $\Omega^{\prime} \subset \Omega, \bar{\Omega}^{\prime} \subset \Omega$.

Proof. Let $t \in(0, T)$ be fixed. From ( $10^{\prime}$ ), the reflexivity of $V$ and the compactness of the imbedding $V$ G $H$ we conclude that there exists a subsequence of $\left\{s_{n}(t)\right\}$ (indexed by $n$ again) and $w_{t} \in V$ such that $s_{n}(t) \rightarrow w_{t}$ in $V$ and $s_{n}(t) \rightarrow w_{t}$ in $H$. By the diagonalization method a subsequence of $\left\{s_{n}\right\}$ can be chosen (denoted again by $\left\{s_{n}\right\}$ ) such that $s_{n}(t)$ is weakly convergent in $V$ and strongly convergent in $H$ for all rational points of $I$. On the other hand ( $13^{\prime}$ ) implies that this subsequence is convergent (locally uniformly) for all $t \in I$. Hence and from the Borel covering theorem we conclude that $s_{n}(t) \rightarrow s(t)$ in $H$ uniformly with respect to $t \in I$. Thus, we have $s_{n} \rightarrow s$ in $C(I, H)$. Hence and from (10') we conclude $s_{n}(t) \rightharpoonup s(t)$ in $V$ for all $t \in(0, T)$. Thus, owing to $\left(10^{\prime}\right), s \in L_{\infty}(I, V)$. Passing to the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$ in the identity

we obtain

Passing to the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$ in (13') we have $\left|s(t)-s\left(t^{\prime}\right)\right| \leqq C\left|t-t^{\prime}\right|$ for all $t, t^{\prime} \in I$. Hence we have (see [9], [10])

We find out easily that the original sequence (not only a subsequence) $\left\{s_{n}\right\}$ converges to $\mathrm{d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2}$ in $C(I, H)$. Now, we prove $u_{n} \rightarrow u$ in $C\left(I, V \cap W_{2}^{k+l}\left(\Omega^{\prime}\right)\right)$. The element $u(t)-\bar{u}_{n}(t)(t$ is fixed $)$ is the weak solution of the linear elliptic equation

(uniformly with respect to $t \in I$ ). From the regularity results (see [8]) we obtain the estimate

for $n \rightarrow \infty$ uniformly with respect to $t \in I$. Since $\left(\mathrm{d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2}\right) \in C(I, H)$ and $u \in C(I, V)$, the equation

Remark 3. We have used regularity results in the interior of the domain $\Omega$. If $\partial \Omega \in C^{k}$ and if we have, e.g., homogeneous Dirichlet boundary value problem (in the more general case see [8]) then the results obtained hold true for $\Omega$ (instead of $\Omega^{\prime}$ ).

Remark 4. All the results can be obtained also in the case $a_{i j}=a_{i j}(t, x)$ under the assumptions

The proofs are technically more complicated (in this direction see also [1]).

## II. HYPERBOLIC VARIATIONAL INEQUALITIES

Applying Rothe's method we reduce the solution of the hyperbolic variational inequality (6) to the solution of the elliptic variational inequalities (7). Existence and uniqueness of the solutions $z_{i} \in K(i=1, \ldots, n)$ of the variational inequality (7) is guaranteed, e.g., by $[12]$ (Theorems 8.1, 8.2). By means of $z_{i}(i=1, \ldots, n)$ we define $u_{i}=U_{0}+\sum_{j=1}^{i} h z_{i}$ for $1 \leqq i \leqq n$ and $u_{0}=U_{0}, u_{-1}=-h U_{1}+u_{0}, u_{-2}=$ $=h^{2}\left(-A U_{0}+F\left(0, U_{0}\right)\right)+2 u_{-1}-u_{0}$, where $U_{0}, U_{1}$ are from (2). In this part we shall assume $U_{0} \in V, U_{1} \in K$. Analogously as in Part I we define $u_{n}(t), \bar{u}_{n}(t), z_{n}(t)$, $\bar{z}_{n}(t), s_{n}(t)$ and $\bar{s}_{n}(t)$.

A priori estimates. Lemma 5. Let $U_{1} \in K, A U_{0} \in H$ and let (8), (9) be satisfied. Then there exist $n_{0}$ and $C$ such that the estimate

$$

which implies (Gronwall's lemma) $\left\|z_{j}\right\|^{2} \leqq C$ for all $n, j=1, \ldots, n$. Hence and from $u_{i}=U_{0}+h \sum_{j=1}^{i} z_{j}$ the estimate $\left\|u_{i}\right\| \leqq C$ follows. Thus, (28) implies the required result.

As a consequence of Lemma 4, analogously as in Part I, the a priori estimates

$$
\begin{align*}
& \left\|u_{n}(t)\right\|+\left\|z_{n}(t)\right\|+\left|s_{n}(t)\right| \leqq C ;  \tag{29}\\
& \left\|\bar{u}_{n}(t)\right\|+\left\|\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right\|+\left|\bar{s}_{n}(t)\right| \leqq C ; \tag{30}
\end{align*}
$$

hold for all $n$ and $t, t^{\prime} \in I$. We rewrite the inequality into the form

$$
\begin{gather*}
\left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^{-} z_{n}(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}, v-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right)+\left\langle A \bar{u}_{n}(t), v-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right\rangle \geqq\left(F^{(n)}\left(t, \bar{u}_{n}\left(t-\frac{T}{n}\right)\right), v-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right)  \tag{33}\\
\text { for all } t \in(0, T)
\end{gather*}
$$

Before passing to the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$ in (33) we prove the convergence of $\left\{u_{n}(t)\right\}$ and $\left\{z_{n}(t)\right\}$.

Lemma 6. Let $U_{1} \in K, A U_{0} \in H$ and let (8), (9) be satisfied. Then there exists $u \in C(I, V)$ with $\mathrm{d} u / \mathrm{d} t \in L_{\infty}(I, V) \cap C(I, H), \mathrm{d}^{2} u / \mathrm{d} t^{2} \in L_{\infty}(I, H)$ such that $u_{n} \rightarrow u$ in $C(I, V)$ and $z_{n} \rightarrow \mathrm{~d} u / \mathrm{d} t$ in $C(I, H)$. The estimate

$$
\left|\frac{\mathrm{d}^{-} u_{n}(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}-\frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right|^{2}+\left\|u_{n}(t)-u(t)\right\|^{2} \leqq \frac{C}{n}
$$

takes place for all $n$ and $t \in I$.
Proof. Let us consider (33) for $n=r, v=\bar{z}_{s}(t)$ and $n=s, v=\bar{z}_{r}(t)$. Subtracting these inequalities we obtain ( $t$ is omitted)

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^{-}\left(z_{r}-z_{s}\right)}{\mathrm{d} t}, z_{r}-z_{s}\right)+\left\langle A\left(\bar{u}_{r}-\bar{u}_{s}\right), \bar{z}_{r}-\bar{z}_{s}\right\rangle \leqq\left(F^{(r)}\left(t, \bar{u}_{r}\left(t-\frac{T}{r}\right)\right)-\right. \\
& \left.\quad-F^{(s)}\left(t, \bar{u}_{s}\left(t-\frac{T}{s}\right)\right), \bar{z}_{r}-\bar{z}_{s}\right)+\left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^{-}\left(z_{r}-z_{s}\right)}{\mathrm{d} t}, z_{r}-\bar{z}_{r}+\bar{z}_{s}-z_{s}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Hence and from (31), analogously as in Lemma 3, we obtain the required result. The assertion $\mathrm{d} u / \mathrm{d} t \in L_{\infty}(I, V)$ follows from (32) after passing to the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$.

- The proof is complete.

Theorem 3. Suppose (8), (9) and $U_{0} \in V, U_{1} \in K, A U_{0} \in H$. Then there exists a unique solution of the hyperbolic variational inequality (6) with the following properties:

$$
u \in C(I, V), \quad \frac{\mathrm{d} u}{\mathrm{~d} t} \in C(I, H) \cap L_{\infty}(I, K), \quad \frac{\mathrm{d}^{2} u}{\mathrm{~d} t^{2}} \in L_{\infty}(I, H) .
$$

The estimate

$$
\left\|u_{n}(t)-u(t)\right\|^{2}+\left|\frac{\mathrm{d}^{-} u_{n}(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}-\frac{\mathrm{d} u}{\mathrm{~d} t}\right|^{2} \leqq \frac{C}{n}
$$

takes place for all $n$ and $t \in I$.
Proof. Integrating (33) over $\left(t_{1}, t_{2}\right), 0<t_{1}<t_{2}<T$, we have

$$
\begin{gather*}
\int_{t_{1}}^{t_{2}}\left(\frac{\mathrm{~d}^{-} z_{n}(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}, v-\dot{\bar{z}}_{n}(t)\right) \mathrm{d} t+\int_{t_{1}}^{t_{2}}\left\langle A \bar{u}_{n}(t), v-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right\rangle \mathrm{d} t \geqq  \tag{34}\\
\geqq \int_{t_{1}}^{t_{2}}\left(F^{(n)}\left(t, \bar{u}_{n}\left(t-\frac{T}{n}\right)\right), v-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right) \mathrm{d} t .
\end{gather*}
$$

Owing to (30) there exists a subsequence of $\left\{\bar{s}_{n}(t)\right\}$ and $s \in L_{2}(I, H)$ such that $\bar{s}_{n} \rightarrow s$ in $L_{2}(I, H)$. Passing to the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$ in the identity

$$
\left(z_{n}(t), v\right)-\left(U_{1}, v\right)=\int_{0}^{t}(\bar{s}(\tau), v) \mathrm{d} \tau
$$

and using $z(t)=\mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t$ we easily find out $s(t)=\mathrm{d}^{2} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t^{2}$. Hence and from Lemma 6 we conclude

$$
\int_{t_{2}}^{t_{1}}\left(\frac{\mathrm{~d}^{-} z_{n}(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}, v-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right) \mathrm{d} t \rightarrow \int_{t_{1}}^{t_{2}}\left(\frac{\mathrm{~d}^{2} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t^{2}}, v-\frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right) \mathrm{d} t
$$

for $n \rightarrow \infty$ and arbitrary $v \in K$. From (30) and Lemma 6 we conclude that there exists a subsequence of $\left\{\bar{z}_{n}\right\}$ (we use the index $n$ again) such that $\bar{z}_{n} \rightarrow \mathrm{~d} u / \mathrm{d} t$ in $L_{2}(I, V)$ (moreover, $w^{*}$ - weakly in $L_{\infty}(I, V)$ ). Hence and from Lemma 6 we obtain

$$
\int_{t_{1}}^{t_{2}}\left\langle A \bar{u}(t), v-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right\rangle \mathrm{d} t \rightarrow \int_{t_{1}}^{t_{2}}\left\langle A u(t), v-\frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right\rangle \mathrm{d} t \text { for } n \rightarrow \infty
$$

and for all $v \in K$. Finally, from the estimates (30)-(32), (9) and Lemma 6 we easily obtain

$$
\int_{t_{1}}^{t_{2}}\left(F^{(n)}\left(t, \bar{u}_{n}\left(t-\frac{T}{n}\right)\right), v-\bar{z}_{n}(t)\right) \mathrm{d} t \rightarrow \int_{t_{1}}^{t_{2}}\left(F(t, u(t)), v-\frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right) \mathrm{d} t
$$

for $n \rightarrow \infty$. Thus, taking the limit for $n \rightarrow \infty$ in (34) we obtain (6) since $t_{1}, t_{2} \in I$ are arbitrary. For fixed $t \in(0, T)$ there exists a subsequence $\left\{\bar{z}_{n_{k}}(t)\right\}$ such that $\bar{z}_{n_{k}}(t) \rightarrow$ $\rightarrow w_{t}$ in $V$ because of (30). On the other hand, $\bar{z}_{n_{k}}(t) \rightarrow \mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t$ in $H$ and hence $w_{t}=$ $=\mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t$. Thus, the original sequence $\bar{z}_{n}(t)$ weakly converges to $\mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t$ in $V$ for all $t \in I$. Since $\bar{z}_{n}(t) \in K$ (for all $n$ and $t \in I$ ) and $K$ is a closed convex set, $\mathrm{d} u(t) / \mathrm{d} t \in K$ for all $t \in I$. Lemma 6 implies $\mathrm{d} u(0) / \mathrm{d} t=z(0)=U_{1}$ since $z_{n}(0)=U_{1}$. Similarly we have $u(0)=U_{0}$. The uniqueness of such a solution can be proved from (6) by a standard procedure. When $u_{1}, u_{2}$ are two solutions of (6) then $u=u_{1}-u_{2}$ satisfies the inequality

$$
\left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^{2} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t^{2}}, \frac{\mathrm{~d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right)+\left\langle A u(t), \frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right\rangle \leqq\left(F\left(t, u_{1}(t)\right)-F\left(t, u_{2}(t)\right), \frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right)
$$

Integrating this inequality and using (8), (9) we have

$$
\left|\frac{\mathrm{d} u(t)}{\mathrm{d} t}\right|^{2}+\|u(t)\|^{2} \leqq C \int_{0}^{t}\|u(\tau)\|\left|\frac{\mathrm{d} u(\tau)}{\mathrm{d} \tau}\right| \mathrm{d} \tau .
$$

Since $\mathrm{d} u(0) / \mathrm{d} t=0$ and $u(0)=0$, owing to Gronwall's lemma we conclude $u(t)=0$ which implies uniqueness. The proof of Theorem 3 is complete.

Remark 5. All the results in Section I and Section II hold true if we assume
( $8^{\prime}$ ) there exists $\alpha>0$ such that $\langle A u, v\rangle+\alpha(u, v)$ is an equivalent scalar product in $V$ instead of (8).
